I've been in my role for a little over 4 years ago, and when I first got hired, I was told "It's so easy for students to be considered for scholarships through the CESHS because they just have to fill out one application for the majority of our scholarship opportunities. So just tell them to fill out the WSU Scholarship Application and they'll be considered for any and all of the scholarship opportunities we have for which they qualify."

Quite the mouthful.

It's true, though, that theoretically, I can just say "don't worry about it, just apply and you'll be awarded if you're awarded."

But I do think that idea is pretty abstract and makes it impossible for you to understand what's at stake.

All* you need to do is:

1. Complete the WSU Scholarship Application
2. Complete the FAFSA/WASFA

\$2000 minimum amount, if awarded

*This is the minimum amount of work that needs to be done to be considered for many of our awards, but there are occasionally one off applications you must complete to be considered for certain awards with specific and/or difficult to match criteria, and we can't get that information using the WSU Scholarship Application alone.

Priority deadline for both the WSU Scholarship Application and the FAFSA/WASFA is JANUARY 31.

One application – tons of opportunity

Not only does this application consider you for most CESHs scholarships, but it also considers you for other scholarships available at the University Level. Handled by Student Financial Services, there are some scholarships you can be awarded through their process, as well.

FAFSA- even if you don't think you'll get any federal loans or grants, if you can get access to the data you need to complete it, we suggest still filling it out.

So many of our awards have the phrase "demonstrated financial need" as a piece of its criteria and the way that is determined is with the FAFSA's Student Aid Index (formerly known as the Expected Family Contribution). I'll break down what Demonstrated Financial Need is later in the presentation.

Through the CESHs awarding process, if you're awarded, the minimum amount will be \$2000.

Periodically, there will be a few funds that are awarded outside the regular scholarship process, just due to the complex nature of the criteria, or the award amount varies based on the application. The WSU Scholarship Application doesn't always ask the questions we need answers to.



The College of Education, Sport, and Human Sciences has over 100 named (donor-established) scholarships, 80% of which are endowments.

What's an endowment?

An investment that is used to generate income and produces distributions, which are what we are able to award each year. They're set up to do this in perpetuity. These are personal dollars donated by alumni, friends, philanthropists, and we're thankful for them.

For the 25-26 school year, there was over \$457,000 in scholarship funding awarded (not including the Logan Scholarship).

We have scholarships that are for any student in the College of Education, Sport, and Human Sciences, and we have some that are specifically required to be awarded to students of Average Educational Achievement, or some that are for students who have financial need even if their FAFSA says otherwise. Scholarships intended for first generation college students, those focusing on math or science education, etc.

There are quite a few departmental specific awards available. There are 50 endowments for teaching & learning alone. So you can see the available funding and see there is quite a bit to try to receive



Significant gifts of note – While I can't list out all 100+ funds, I will highlight the funds the College has that make the largest impact for the most students.



Teacher Education

- **The Glenn & Anna Powell Scholarship - \$40,000 available**
 - "Students pursuing a degree in education with the **intent of teaching.**"
- **Laurence J. Peter - \$5000 awards per student, between 5-8 students awarded per year**
 - For graduate students in Teaching & Learning whose professional focus will be the direct improvement of the performance of the teaching act (as opposed to administration, counseling, or other specialties that may improve teaching indirectly).
 - Requires a separate application
- **Linda Bump Undergrad Fellowship - \$4000 awards for 4-6 students per year**
 - For undergraduate students who are pursuing a degree in the areas of elementary or secondary education.
- **Logan Scholarship – more details at the end of this presentation**

*Priority deadline for both the WSU Scholarship Application and the FAFSA/WASFA is **JANUARY 31.***

Kinesiology & Athletic Training

- Ronald Kelley Scholarship - \$5000 to Athletic Training students
 - "For students majoring Athletic Training"
- Viola (Quinn) Vincent Scholarship - \$2000 awards for 9 students
 - "For under-represented students majoring in Sport Science, Athletic Training, or Sport Management. Consideration should also be given to letters of rec, contributions to community/university/program, professional potential, progress toward degree, and GPA. Receipt of other scholarships will not disqualify applicants from consideration for this scholarship."
- Steen-Smith Health & Fitness Endowment - \$3000 awards for 3 students
 - "For students in Kinesiology"

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Sport Management

- Washburn-Durrant Sport Management Scholarship - \$30,000 awarded, with varying amounts (\$2000-3000 per student)
 - Preference for scholarships shall be given to certified majors and/or graduate students with a 3.0 GPA or higher who are enrolled on the Pullman Campus. Secondary considerations may include financial need and/or service to department, university, or community.

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Educational Leadership

- Dorothy B. Cook Scholarship Fund - \$4,000 awards per student, 2-4 students per year
 - Graduate students enrolled within the College of Education, with ties to WSU Pullman, pursuing degrees in school administration.
- Educational Leadership has 3 scholarships that are applied for and awarded outside the regular scholarship process due to the requirements of the award, as well as the timeline of the Educational Leadership program
 - Glenys Hill Full Tuition
 - Glenys Hill single year award
 - LEAD scholarship, specific for LEAD program students

Priority deadline for both the WSU Scholarship Application and the FAFSA/WASFA is JANUARY 31.





Educational Psychology

- One named scholarship only, but we have ear marked some “unrestricted” funds for Ed Psych students to help share the funding

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“Demonstrated Financial Need”



Student Aid Index (SAI) minus Cost of Attendance (COA)


Student Aid Index (SAI) is the number provided at the end of your FAFSA form.

According to the Department of Education, “The SAI formula calculates the **total financial resources of you and your parents** (or spouse in some cases) then deducts the **minimum amount needed for your family's normal annual living expenses**. The remaining amount may, in part, be allocated for college expenses”.

The range of the SAI is -1500 to 999999.

1. Complete the FAFSA for the upcoming school year, choosing WSU as a recipient of your results
2. Your Student Aid Index will be populated into your scholarship application, therefore allowing us to determine if you “have need.” It’s also on your student account.

Student Aid Index (SAI) minus Cost of Attendance (COA)

Cost of Attendance (COA) at WSU

According to Student Financial Services, “**cost of attendance** is a total of your estimated expenses, including both your **direct costs** from the university (like tuition) and your **indirect costs** (like transportation).” Cost of attendance varies by campus location, career path, and whether you’re a Washington Resident or a non-resident.

“Demonstrated Financial Need”



Student Aid Index (SAI) minus Cost of Attendance (COA)

If SAI-COA results in a negative number (even if it's -1), this is considered “demonstrated” financial need.

Examples:

- Joey Tribbiani: SAI = 17,687, and he is an undergraduate, Pullman campus student who is also a Washington Resident.
 - COA = **36,804**
 - $17,687 - 36,804 = -19,117$
 - Joey **has** demonstrated financial need.
- Rachel Green: SAI = 84,155, and she is an undergraduate, Spokane Campus student, from New York.
 - COA = **52,544**
 - $84,155 - 52,544 = +31,611$
 - Rachel does **not** show demonstrated financial need.
- Phoebe Buffay: SAI = -1500, and she is a graduate student, on the Vancouver Campus, and is from Massachusetts.
 - COA = **53,544**
 - $-1500 - 53,544 = -55,044$
 - Phoebe **has** demonstrated financial need.

Scholarship Application TIPS AND TRICKS! *Priority deadline for both the WSU Scholarship Application and the FAFSA/WASFA is **JANUARY 31.***

Your Personal Statement

We use the average scores of all your personal statements to rank as a starting point for awarding scholarships

Special Circumstances

Helps us make choices when financial need isn't required and the award is competitive.

Your Activities

In your career interests and aspirations box, make sure to actually say what you want to do, explicitly.

Your Personal Statements:

When our reviewers read your application, they're reading and scoring the answers to these prompts.

We highly recommend not using AI to generate these answers. When we review, we can tell. Especially faculty who have read your essays before. Just be honest, and answer with complete sentences.

The page here does recommend writing these answers in a word document to paste in the form itself once you're done (making sure to keep to the 110 word limit), so you don't lose any work. We second that!

There's a question at the end of the Personal statements section that says "Please tell us about any special circumstances or financial need that may not be covered by the FAFSA/WASFA."

We cannot use this answer to award "demonstrated financial need" awards, it does help us decide other awards when they're competitive.

Your Activities Section:

"Please share with us your career interests and aspirations." question. Be direct!!!!!! "I want to teach third grade" or "I want to run events at the Seattle Mariners" or "I want to be a chiropractor."

Answers like “I am excited to become a confident teacher that encourages students learning.” are WONDERFUL, but there are scholarship criteria that requires the award goes to “Students studying in Teaching & Learning with Preference given to students with 3.0+ GPA and who intend to teach **math or science in the middle grades**”.

The application itself either asks for or populates the answers for each piece of this prompt, EXCEPT the “math or science in the middle grades” portion. That’s where the career plan question and your answer come in.

For students pursuing a degree in teaching or a certificate in teaching, make sure you answer the question “Do you plan to teach in the public schools system (any grade, Pre-K through 12th grade)?”, shown here on the screen. It’s buried, and I’ve requested it lives outside of this “Personal Experiences” subsection. But as of this presentation, it lives in here.

This question helps us populate the Logan Scholarship candidates list. More on that later. Additionally, we have a few scholarships for Kinesiology students that have the criteria “for students in Kinesiology, preference for those interested in teaching kinesiology or sport science.”

The CESHS Process

- The WSU Scholarship Application priority deadline for the University is January 31.
- CESHS Priority deadline is February 28.
- Students awarded must complete our acceptance form and submit a Thank You letter to the donors/family of donors before any funding is distributed
 - Deadlines for acceptance will be the notification email
 - Failure to accept = re-awarded scholarship to someone else
- Scholarships hit student accounts in the week leading to school starting, sometimes not until a week into the semester starting, will absolutely be applied prior to the first Late Fee deadline.



I know I've been saying "January 31" is the deadline, and it is, but technically CESHS's deadline is February 28th. Our secondary certificate student applications into the program are not decided until February 28, or shortly thereafter, so to ensure we get the application of every eligible student, I wait until March 1 to pull applications. I do want to stress that you should still get your application in by January 31! There are lots of opportunities to get scholarships at a University level that you'll miss out on if you miss the January 31 deadline. But worst case scenario, you can complete your application prior to February 28 to be considered for CESHS awards.

The CESHS Process

- Committee reads and scores applications
 - Your personal statement section only
 - Students can be awarded a "Gold Star"
 - Blind read & review
 - Three weeks of reviews, two weeks of meetings for departmental subcommittee meetings, then notifications start going out. Typically, mid-late April.
- ONLY students who were chosen for awards will be contacted



Scholarship Applications Open Now

- LEAD Scholarship
 - For LEAD Program students in the Principal Certification program
 - \$6000 awards for many students, with one student awarded an additional \$2000
 - *Updated date! Now have until Nov. 21, 2025

Scholarship Applications Open Now

- Ferrucci Math, Science, and Technology Educator Award
 - For Teaching & Learning Grad students or WSU Alum teaching in Puyallup/surrounding areas
 - Aiming to improve STEM teaching in schools
 - Award amount varies based on project proposal (awards are usually between \$10,000 and \$20,000)
- Robert Pharr Graduate Fellowship Award
 - For Math & Science Education, PhD or Educational Leadership, EdD
 - Award amount: \$10,000
- Dean Michael & Fran Trevisan Research Award
 - For doctoral students collecting/analyzing dissertation data
 - Award: \$500
- Laurence J. Peter Graduate Fellowship Award
 - MIT students, aiming to improve the act of teaching
 - Award: \$5000, multiple awards available



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Special Consideration

The RH & Jane Logan Scholarship

- “Awarded...to undergraduate and graduate students who plan to teach in the public school system, have a 3.0 GPA or higher, and have demonstrated financial need.”

The Endowment is \$22 million, resulting in \$800,000 available to award each year.

As of May 2025, the coordination and awarding of the Logan Scholarship was handled by Student Financial Services, and while they tried their best, they don't have the capacity to take the time this scholarship awarding needs to ensure we're helping as many students as possible. So in May, they handed the process over to us here in the college, and we were able to award \$1.2 million for the 2025-2026 school year to over 160 students. Moving forward, we'll be able to award \$800,000 to roughly 100-120 students.

Remember this from earlier? SAI minus COA equals Demonstrated Financial Need, and only if you have a negative number will you be considered for the Logan.



Special Consideration

The RH & Jane Logan Scholarship



Before 2025 2026 Academic Year

- Students awarded the Logan Scholarship for the 2024, 2025 school year or earlier
 - Recipients will continue to receive the award for up to 4 years total, per their award letter from Student Financial Services, if they continue to meet the Logan criteria listed above.
 - The amounts of the award will continue to match the awards laid out in the Terms & Conditions established by Student Financial Services at the time of the initial award
 - First year and sophomore level is \$5,000 per year and junior, senior and graduate level is \$8,000 per year. Recipients may also be eligible for an additional \$5,000 for one semester while they are student teaching.

Again, for the last ten years, SFS awarded this scholarship, and it was awarded to students as a guaranteed 4-year award, with progressively increased award amounts, as long as students continued to meet the Logan criteria. For those students who were awarded in 24-25 or earlier, you will CONTINUE to receive the Logan and the amounts awarded as promised by SFS, as long as you continue to meet the criteria.



Special Consideration

The RH & Jane Logan Scholarship



Beginning the 2025 2026 Academic Year

- First time recipients of the Logan Scholarship beginning the 2025 2026 school year, must complete the WSU Scholarship Application each year and meet the Logan criteria listed above. Funding is not automatically renewed or guaranteed.
- The Logans wanted this money to be transformational, and impact students embarking on their teaching journey. Where we see the most struggle financially for students is when they start their pre internship, and internship semesters.
- Award amounts now determined by student Academic Journey Point.

For those who were awarded the Logan for the first time in 25-26, and beyond, these students are not guaranteed funding for 4 years, just one year at a time.

So our focus moving forward will be to help those students who are in the most financially difficult semesters they have.
